DIGITAL PUBLISHING

Digital Publishing Services aims to increase the impact and visibility of KU-affiliated research. Our online open access publishing model follows best practices and standards that are designed to increase the reach of the research, as well as provide long-term stewardship of the material after publication. Formats include books, journals, conference proceedings, working papers and technical reports, and departmental research publications.



KU SCHOLARWORKS

Achieve greater visibility for your scholarship by submitting it to KU ScholarWorks, the open digital repository for KU-authored scholarship. KU ScholarWorks openly shares published articles, theses, dissertations, performances, monographs, and other creative works.

When Bruce Lieberman assumed leadership of the Paleontological Institute he also took on editorial duties for the "Treatise on Invertebrate Paleontology." The definitive multi-authored work with more than 50 volumes has been published since the 1950s, but hasn't been broadly accessible. With the help of KU Libraries, Lieberman and his team have increased the reach of the research contained inside by publishing the journal as open access.

COLLECTIONS

KENNETH SPENCER RESEARCH LIBRARY

Spencer Library supports faculty as instructors and researchers by providing access to rich collections of original, rare, and unique materials from the university, Kansas, and around the world.

SPRINTS WEEK

Partner with a team of librarians on a project or component of a broader research or teaching project, including course assignment redesign to improve information literacy outcomes. Teams work intensively for five days during May intersession, collaborating without distractions to produce a tangible product or outcome. Sprinters are selected by way of an application process and awarded a \$1,000 stipend.

DIGITAL HUMANITIES

The Institute for Digital Research in the Humanities (IDRH), is a partnership with the Hall Center for the Humanities, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and KU Libraries. IDRH provides resources and training in the practices and tools of the digital humanities, facilitating interdisciplinary academic collaborations and innovative research, and creating external funding opportunities.

GIS AND MAPPING

The libraries assist with data, mapping, and geographic information systems, providing consultation, teaching and learning assistance, and software and data access. The GIS and Data Lab, located on the fourth floor of Watson Library, is available for walk-in use or by appointment for consultations.

DATA MANAGEMENT

KU Libraries support the campus research community by facilitating the management, storage, documentation, sharing, and reuse of research data, by:

- Providing instruction on file naming and organization, data and software citation, file and metadata formats, and preservation strategies
- Connecting researchers with available data storage and access services
- Providing guidance and templates for data management plans
- Providing grant support

SOFTWARE CARPENTRY

Learn fundamental skills that can increase productivity and improve the quality and reproducibility of research projects. Hands-on workshops teach how to automate tasks using the Unix shell, track and share work using version control, and how to write software in Python or R that is readable, reusable, and reliable. KU's cohort of certified Carpentries instructors offer workshops multiple times per year.

SYSTEMATIC REVIEWS

Systematic reviews attempt to identify, appraise and synthesize empirical evidence that meets pre-specified eligibility criteria to answer a specific research question. Librarians advise researchers on the review process, search for existing reviews, select appropriate literature databases, design and execute search strategies, document the search process, manage search results and collect citations, and write the methods section of a resulting manuscript.

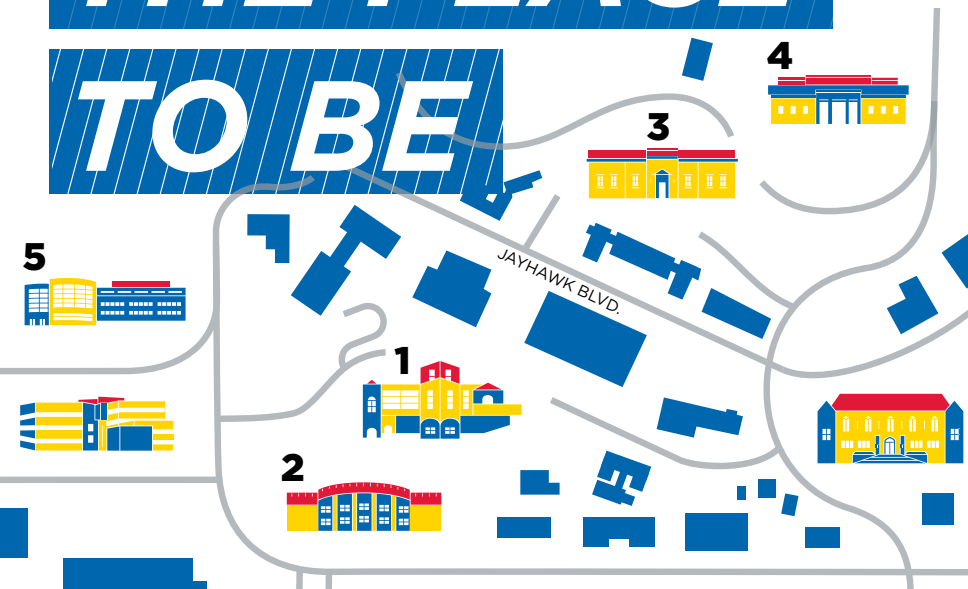
